Dear Trinity,

What is a Chrismon

This year I used the children's sermons to unpack some of the symbolism of Advent. When I got to the Chrismons, I ended up so far down the rabbit hole that I decided to write it up as a newsletter article. If you saw the children's sermon on the Third Sunday in Advent, this is the more detailed version of that.

The Chrismon Tree was invented by Frances Kipps Spencer in 1957. Mrs. Spencer was a member of Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virgina. Ascension is still an active ELCA congregation today. Mrs. Spencer traces the origin of the tree to Christmas 1940, when the Rev. George Pass came by the Spencer home to wish them a Merry Christmas. When he saw the discarded gift wrap, he made the unusual request of asking if he could take it. He explained that the little church he served couldn't afford to buy decorations for their Christmas tree, and when he saw the pretty paper and bows, it inspired him that he could take those items and make decorations himself. The Spencers were so moved by Rev. Pass's devotion that they started making their own Christmas ornaments to decorate their family tree. She wrote, "Because of the minister's inspiration, I became a semi-professional at creating new and unusual Christmas trees."

For years the Spencer family tradition of crafting their own ornaments remained simply a family tradition. All that changed in 1956 when, for whatever reason, Mrs. Spencer first noticed, really noticed the Christmas tree in the sanctuary at her church. She'd seen trees in churches before, but had always shrugged them off as secular, not really belonging in worship. But that year, wrote Spencer, "I saw, and appreciated, the people behind the tree. That tree made me aware of those members who cared enough to do what they could; I again recognized the simple and profound dedication of being willing to give. And the one who was a professional was giving nothing. Because I was not willing to participate, the congregation was not making its full offering."

And so, that spring, Mrs. Spencer volunteered to decorate the tree in the church for Christmas. She decided to create ornaments that would tell the story of Jesus through symbols. As she was learning more about Christian symbols, she stumbled across the word "chrismon." Chrismon is the combination of two words, Chris from Christ and mon from monogram. Chris-mon, Christ monogram, refers to the Greek letters Chi (χ) and Rho (ρ), which are the first letters in the Greek spelling of Christ ($\chi \rho i \sigma \tau \delta \varsigma$). The first Chrismons were just plays on the basic $\chi \rho$ design. From there, she expanded and got more complicated, bringing in different themes and images. Because, said Mrs. Spencer, "There is always something new to say about God, always a better way to say it. Through the ages the church has found varied ways of telling the Good News, and the living church of today will find still other ways of making God's love more meaningful and apparent to humanity."

The most important part of the Chrismon tree tradition for Mrs. Spencer was that people be able to interpret and understand the symbols, to learn and tell the story of Jesus from the tree. She felt that any tree displayed in public should have explanations of all the symbols available for people to learn and study. Here are a few of the Chrismons from our tree and the explanations of them.



Triangle and Trinitarian Both are symbols of the Trinity



Tau Cross With Snake

The Tau Cross, the oldest form of the Cross, reveals that similar to Moses' lifting of a bronze serpent to save Israel, Christ saved humanity after being raised on a cross.



Jerusalem Cross or Crusaders Cross

The Four Evangelists: The four smaller crosses represent the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John *The spread of Christianity*: The four smaller crosses represent the spread of Christianity to the four corners of the Earth. *The five wounds of Christ*: The five crosses represent the five wounds of Christ, with the four smaller crosses representing

the wounds of his hands and feet, and the large cross representing the wound to his heart.



Fish

The first letter of each Greek word for "Jesus Christ, God's Son, savior" spell the Greek word for "fish". The Ichthys symbol was used by the early Christians as a secret sign to designate themselves as believers in Jesus.



Chi Rho

Two Greek letters which are the first letters in the Greek word for Christ.



Jesus Christ Victor

IC (iota and sigma) are the first and last letters in the Greek word for Jesus. XC (chi and sigma) are the first and last letters in the Greek word for Christ. NIKA (nu, iota, kappa, alpha) is the Greek word for victor. Jesus is the Victor!



Triquetra (Triangle)

The three equal arcs express eternity in its continuous form and indivisibility in its interweaving. It symbolizes the One God who showed Himself to humanity in three separate and distinct persons, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.



Five-Pointed Star and Rose

The symbolism of the rose is derived from Isaiah's prophecy of Zion's glory.

"The desert shall rejoice, and blossom as the rose." It has come to symbolize the Messiah. It is also used for Mary. The combination of the rose and the five-point star is the two natures of Christ: He is true God and He is true Man.

As a first step in this process, a task force from across the ELCA has released draft edits to the social statement, which address possible word changes without changing the substantive meaning of the statement. Ingredients:

roll (16.5 oz) Pillsbury refrigerated chocolate chip cookies
 C chopped toasted pecans
 bag (11 oz) caramels, unwrapped
 Tbsp milk
 tsp kosher (coarse) salt

- 1. Heat oven to 350 degrees.
- In a medium bowl, crumble cookie dough; stir or knead in 12 C of the pecans until well mixed. Press evenly in an ungreased 9-inch square pan
- 3. Bake 18 to 22 minutes or until they're a deep golden brown. Cool 30 minutes.
- 4. In medium microwavable bowl, microwave caramels and ilk uncovered on High 2 to 3 minutes, stirring every 60 seconds, until melted and smooth. Pour evenly over the cooled bar cooles. Sprinkle with pretzels and remaining ¼ C pecans, pressing slightly into caramel. Sprinkle with salt. Cool about 1 hour, 30 minutes or until caramel is set. For bars, cut into
- 5. 4 rows by 4 rows. Store covered in refrigerator.
